This activity is designed to help you research into sources of LMI, and assess their reliability and credibility. The following outlines some of the most widely used LMI sources for careers work. Careers Information

On these sites you can find out about careers, including work hours, salary, day to day roles and responsibilities, routes into the career, case studies and links to other reliable online sources.

Job Aggregators

Job aggregators pull vacancies from multiple sites into one place. Find out how many jobs are available locally, by entering your town, or nationally, the job roles and responsibilities, the skills, experience and qualifications the employer wants, and the employer name and suggested salary range.

Professional Bodies

These are organisations which work on behalf of a particular profession. They lobby on behalf of their members to get good pay and conditions and provide training and professional development opportunities. Some have careers information on their websites for people considering the profession.
